

# The Indian Order of Precedence

The **Indian Order of Precedence** is a protocol list establishing the hierarchy of important government officials for **ceremonial purposes**. It's a favourite topic for **UPSC Prelims** because of its many nuances and potential for confusion. Here are the key notes and common traps to watch out for.

# Common UPSC Prelims Traps

Here are the specific points of confusion that are often tested:

## Trap 1: Rank Equivalence

Question setters love to ask you to compare ranks.

Remember who shares a rank.

- Rank 6: Chief Justice of India (CJI) = Speaker of Lok Sabha. They are at the same level. A common question might place one above the other.
- Rank 9A: UPSC Chairperson = CEC = CAG. These heads of key constitutional bodies are placed together.

## Trap 2: "Within State" vs. "Outside State" Protocol

This is the most frequently tested nuance.

- A Governor is ranked **#4 "within state"** their own state but drops to **#8** when they are "outside state".
- Similarly, a Chief Minister is ranked **#7 "within state"** their own state but drops to **#8** when "outside state".

# More Critical Traps to Watch

## Trap 3: Constitutional vs. Ceremonial Order

- Not a Line of Succession: The Order of Precedence is for seating at official ceremonials. It has NO legal or constitutional basis and is NOT the line of succession to the office of the President. The Vice-President succeeds the President.
- Maintained by: The list is maintained by the Ministry of Home Affairs.

## Trap 4: Unique and Special Ranks

These are outliers and easy to test.

- Holders of Bharat Ratna (Rank 7A): They are placed very high, above Ambassadors and Supreme Court judges. This is a unique civilian honour recognised in the protocol.
- Former Presidents (Rank 5) are placed above the serving CJI and Speaker.
- Former Prime Ministers (Rank 7) are ranked alongside Union Cabinet Ministers.

# Final Key Points for Success



## Trap 5: Comparing Top Officials

Pay close attention to the top of the list.

- The Prime Minister (#3) is below the Vice-President (#2).
- The CJI and Speaker (#6) are ranked below Former Presidents (#5) and the Deputy PM (if any, #5A).

By focusing on these specific traps—rank equivalence, state-based protocol changes, unique civilian ranks, and the ceremonial nature of the list—you can confidently tackle questions on this topic.
